## “I’ve Got Your Back!”


May I confess something? I’m not really into slang. Sometimes when someone uses slang on Facebook, I am forced to do a Google search to understand the posts of my slangy friends.

Have you ever heard the slang expression: “I’ve got your back”? I looked it up – just to make sure I understood. The *Urban Dictionary* website gives the following definition: “An expression assuring someone that you are watching out for them. Comes from making sure you are safe by watching what’s behind you when you’re busy looking ahead.”

- Pray for Russ as he begins to prepare for teaching classes.


# Progress Report

As you know, Carla and I are returning to Africa as Mission Corps volunteers. We will not be receiving a salary from the Church of the Nazarene during the next two years. While Africa Nazarene University will provide housing and utilities for us and the Africa Region will provide a plan to supplement our health insurance, we will be required to raise support for operational expenses. We need to raise \$21,500 for one-time expense such as the purchase of a vehicle, travel expenses, and household setup.


We need to raise \$1,590 per month for a two-year period for food, consumables, on site travel, etc.

So, how is our support coming

in? Here's the report: For the one-time giving, we have reached our goal of \$21,500! Praise the Lord!



On monthly support, we lack only \$305 out of the goal of \$1,590.
